LETTER TO OUR FRIENDS

2023 was an incredibly fulfilling experience as we focused on celebrating the Museum's 125th anniversary. During this momentous milestone, the Parrish paid tribute to our rich history while embracing new opportunities and deepening the connection between art, artists, and the many communities we serve on the East End and

A major highlight was the Artists Choose Parrish exhibition-a landmark, three-part celebration where 41 renowned artists with deep ties to the East End selected works from our collection to show alongside their own. This impressive array of talent included Marina Adams, Tony Bechara, Vija Celmins, Ralph Gibson, Mary Heilmann, Eddie Martinez, Suzanne McClelland, Enoc Perez, Cindy Sherman, Michelle Stuart, and Stanley Whitney, among many others. The exhibition not only honored the East End's historic artistic legacy but also brought greater attention to the major artists practicing here today. It was a true celebration of creativity and collaboration.

We also presented significant exhibitions such as JR: Les Enfants d'Ouranos (Children of Ouranos), which graced our south façade with a powerful image of refugee children in playful motion and was visible from Montauk Highway, as well as James Brooks: A Painting is a Real Thing, curated by Klaus Ottmann, Ph.D., showcasing over 100 works from the seven-decade career of the renowned Abstract Expressionist artist.

Our public programming in 2023 was equally robust. We presented 40 events, including lectures, concerts, and artist-led talks and tours. In conjunction with our Artists Choose Parrish exhibition, we held panel discussions featuring contemporary artists including Alice Aycock, Sam Moyer, Ugo Rondinone, Sean Scully, and Amy Sillman. Our education collaborations with regional partners, including the Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreation Center and the Eastville Community Historical Society, helped diversify our offerings and further strengthened community ties.

HANK WILLIS THOMAS: REMEMBER ME

MAY 22, 2022–MAY 14, 2023

Remember Me (2022) was a 55-foot neon sign by Hank Willis Thomas installed on the Museum's south façade, replicating a note on a vintage postcard handwritten by a young Black soldier during World War I. Presented as part of *Another Justice: US Is Them, Remember Me* honors those who actively participate in society, but remain unrecognized or forgotten.

MEL KENDRICK: SEEING THINGS IN THINGS NOVEMBER 6, 2022–FEBRUARY 19, 2023

Through more than 70 works spanning five decades, this exhibition explored how Mel Kendrick exploits the essential properties of his selected medium—wood, bronze, rubber, resin, cast paper, or concrete—to create sculptures that inherently lay bare the process by which they were made.

NOVEMBER 19, 2022–APRIL 2, 2023

The groundbreaking investigation revealed the impact of iconic artist Frida Kahlo's dramatic medical history on her life and work. The fully bilingual exhibition provided new insight into the importance of the body to Kahlo as enduring source material for representational and metaphorical depictions of her physical and emotional life.

SEPTEMBER 9-OCTOBER 10, 2023





PUBLIC PROGRAMS

In 2023, the Parrish presented 40 public programs, including 17 lectures and conversations, 5 film screenings, 13 live music and concert performances, and 5 curator- or artist-led tours. The Museum continued to collaborate with regional and cultural partners to present programs that diversify Museum offerings and strengthen community ties. Our 2023 collaborative and programming partners include: Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreational Center, Eastville Community Historical Society, Hamptons DocFest, Hamptons JazzFest, Stony Brook Southampton Hospital Center for Parkinson's Disease, among others.

In celebration of the Museum's 125th Anniversary, the Parrish presented several important lectures and conversations that delved into the Museum's rich history and highlighted pivotal moments, with lectures by Alicia G. Longwell, former Chief Curator, and Donna de Salvo, former Robert Lehman Curator. In conjunction with the Museum's Anniversary exhibition, *Artists Choose Parrish*, the Parrish held artist talks and panel conversations from April through December with participating artists, including: Nanette Carter, Eric Fischl, Nina Yankowitz, Jeremy Dennis, Sam Moyer, Enoc Perez, Suzanne McLelland, Leslie Stratford, Ralph Gibson, John Torreano, Ned Smyth, Marina Adams, Alix Pearlstein, Amy Sillman, and others.

In 2023, the Parrish Art Museum welcomed 7,499 education program participants, marking a 30% increase from 2022. The largest growth for Education Department visiting participants came from school and community programs, which saw a 50% rise in participation.

The Education Department continued to expand Access Parrish, which brings art to youth and adults with special needs through partnerships with organizations like the Alzheimer's Disease Resource Center, Stony Brook Southampton Hospital Center for Parkinson's Disease, New Hour for Women and Children–LI at the Suffolk County Corrections Facility, East End Disability Associates, and Life Skills classes from three local high schools. In 2023, new partners included the Explorer's Club and the Stony Brook Southampton Hospital's Cancer Wellness Center.

In October, the Museum hosted a free Community Day, featuring the Inside Out Project—a photo booth truck that took 200 portraits of community members. These portraits were installed on the Museum's north façade.

Programming for middle and high school students also expanded, with new after-school offerings like Middle School Makers and Arts & Eats for art-loving teens. Additionally, the new Culture Club took children on trips to major cultural institutions in New York City including the Brooklyn Museum, the Museum of Arts & Design, and the Whitney Museum of American Art.

Artist Darlene Charneco collaborated with 310 students on a project displayed in the *2023 Student Exhibition*, which drew 1,000 attendees. In the spring, Salvadoran artist Jose Campos engaged 240 community members in an interactive installation.

Lastly, the Creativity Lounge, launched on Memorial Day weekend, became a vibrant space for visitors of all ages to explore art, engage with exhibitions, and connect creatively.

The Parrish Art Museum's educational programming including Artist-in-Residence, the 2023 Student Exhibition, and Access Parrish—was supported, in part, by property taxpayers from the Southampton School District and Tuckahoe Common School District with additional funding from Milford D. and Janice B. Gerton/ Arts and Letters Foundation; Bobbie Braun/The Neuwirth Foundation; May and Samuel Rudin Family Foundation; Dime Community Bank; The John J. McDonnell Margaret T. O'Brien Foundation; a donor who wishes to remain anonymous; and the Town of Southampton. Additional support for education initiatives was provided by the Museum's annual Spring Fling and Midsummer Party benefit events.

MEMBERSHIP

In 2023, the Museum counted 2,065 households as members, welcoming 200 new members. All three membership programs—Parrish Membership, Business Membership, and the Resident Pass Program experienced slight increases. Member engagement was robust, with 20% of members contributing to admissions, 60% participating in public programs, and over 460 members attending invitation-only events. More than 500 members joined exhibition previews.

Member contributions at the \$5K and \$10K levels continued to grow in 2023, with the addition of 5 new members. Membership revenue increased by 17.5% in 2023, with Business Membership seeing a 24% rise. The Museum's Resident Pass Program (formally the Resident Benefit Membership) saw a slight decline in 2023. Interventions are planned for 2024 to increase awareness of the program and boost engagement through events tailored specifically for residents in the Southampton and Tuckahoe School Districts.

Business Membership growth was due in part to the rise in the business-related events organized with the help of the Museum's Business Council. The Museum offered innovative events led by local business owners with experience in hospitality, finance, and business growth. These events were moved from Thursday to Friday evenings to better align with the Museum's hours and optimize resources.

BENEFIT EVENTS

In 2023, the Parrish hosted several successful benefit events. The Midsummer Dance and Dinner, held on July 14 and 15, attracted over 800 guests and raised over \$1.2 million for the Museum's programs and education initiatives. The weekend honored Katharina Otto-Bernstein, Fred and Robin Seegal, and artists Eddie Martinez, Sam Moyer, and Hank Willis Thomas. Friday's Midsummer Dance featured DJ M.O.S, while Saturday's dinner included cocktails, a seated dinner, a live auction, and dancing. Notable artists such as Alice Aycock, Eddie Martinez, Sam Moyer, and Ugo Rondinone attended the dinner.

Earlier in the year, the Spring Fling on May 6 supported the Museum's educational programs, raising over \$30,000. The event featured music by DJ Marc Bauman, a silent auction, and catering by Elegant Affairs.

The Landscape Pleasures event, held on June 10 and 11, showcased leaders in landscape architecture and private garden tours, raising over \$60,000 for the Museum.





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
